CLC Manages Lodging So Disaster Responders Can Get To Work

Multiple Tornadoes, Floods, Earthquake, Oil Spill Spur Demand Across U.S.

Wichita, Kansas (May 13, 2010) Reacting to floods, tornadoes, earthquakes and the Gulf Coast oil spill, [Corporate Lodging Consultants](#) (CLC) has contracted hotel rooms for more than 2,000 emergency responders supporting disaster areas across the U.S. so far this month.

The lodging services provided by CLC's Rapid Response emergency program are housing agency workers and crews sent for flooding relief in Tennessee and Kentucky, tornado assistance in Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi and Oklahoma; earthquake response in California and environmental clean-up in Alabama.
